Seven members visited the Basildon Dogs Trust recently, following the excellent presentation at our meeting a few months ago. We were treated to a one and half hour tour of the premises with lovely Stephanie. There was no charge, but we each gave a donation. Think we were all surprised at how much bigger it actually is once you get inside and walk around the grounds, albeit a quick look outside for us as it was a very wet day unfortunately. Lots of space for the dogs to run around and walk through the trees.

Anyone watch For Dogs Sake with Pete Best on TV? If you love dogs, I highly recommend it on Sky 132, Freesat 156, U&W, Freeview 25, Virgin 125. We recognised all the spaces, including the operating room, the vets and a few trainers who are on the programme. The Centre had such a lovely relaxed atmosphere and we saw quite a few dogs. Think we all fell in love with at least one (all different). It was nice to see a few posters advising that the dog had been chosen for their home forever. We also liked that we were only allowed to view dogs that were relaxed with people walking by. The dogs definitely come first there. Sadly, they have 2 dogs who have lived there for years, and they have a sponsor scheme for them whereby people can donate £5 a month. Something nice for a family to do or a present for someone maybe. People can also foster dogs until they go to their forever homes.

Various donations were dropped off whilst we were there. They don't accept pillows or cushions but non feathered duvets and blankets are very welcome as well as dog's toys, leads and dog coats, dog food etc., if they don't use them, they will sell them on or give to smaller rescues. The Trust also now provide dog food to dog owners who can't afford to feed their pets as a better alternative to having to rehome purely due to financial difficulties.

They are also always looking at various ways to fund the charity. Stephanie had a Xmas craft stall on 7nd December selling crafty things that the public make and donate and has another booked for the summer. Volunteer posts are advertised on their website.

We were really impressed by the dedication of paid staff and volunteers, the dogs were so loved and well cared for. We are lucky to have this wonderful organisation in our County. Many thanks again to Elaine for arranging such an interesting tour.

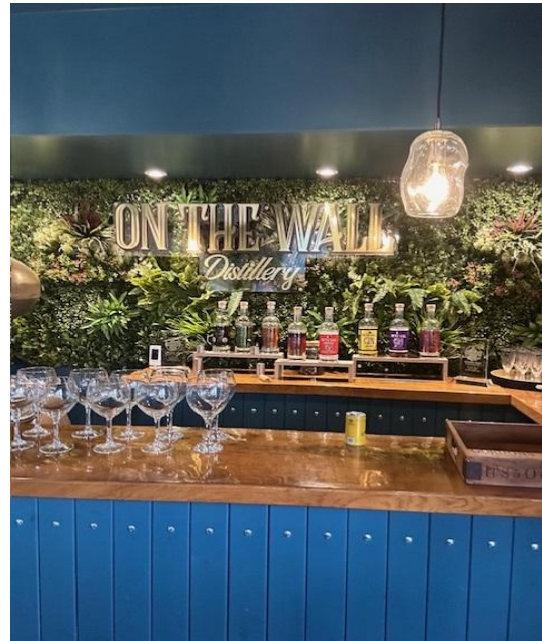

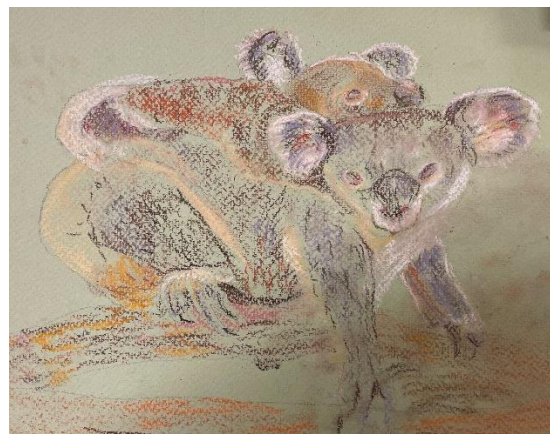
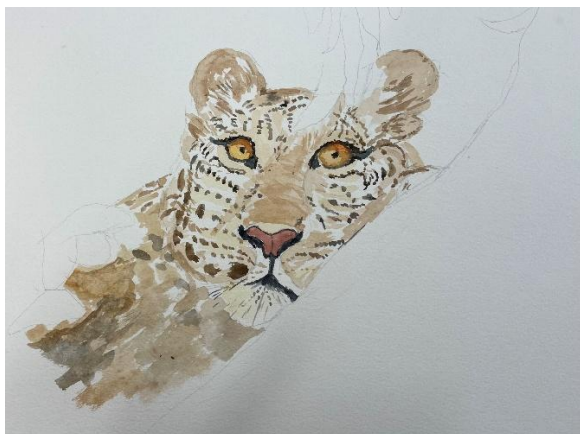

Wine Appreciation Group 2

3-month update Nov 25 - Jan 26

This is about our activity for the last three months, since all the specific arrangements of our wine group, e.g. when we meet, our quarterly subs, etc. can now be found on the SWF website: -

November

This was our last tasting session for 2025 as we reserve December for our annual Christmas evening meal at the Hawk. This month's tasting was about wines from Chile sourced from Nethergate wines with just one South African Rose from Woodwinters in Edinburgh. The wines were from £8.58 with the most expensive a Chardonnay for £15.94, however, this was rated third by the group with the best White being a Viogner grape labeled Los Gansos at £10.98. We also tasted 3 red wines the best being a Gran Reserva Cabernet Sauvignon. We also had a sweet wine, a late harvest Sauvignon Blanc where the grapes are harvested when over ripe and subject to a noble rot giving the sweet wine as SB is normally an acidic wine and one of the top 5 grapes produced all over the world

December



This was our annual get together at the Hawk in Battlesbridge where partners and two new members attended a gathering, which is always enjoyable as the picture indicates.

January 2026

This month we tasted 8 wines which all had a rating of around 4 from Vivino from many submissions of the public. The other object was to compare two Pinotage wines from South Africa, as 2025 was the centennial of the development of this unique red grape there. The two Pinotage wines (£7.65/ £22.46) were tasted together, so a comparison could be made without the price of the wine revealed yet here the expensive one was unanimously picked as the better tasting wine. Another South African red shiraz 2018 was also rated very highly by almost all the group.

Each month we search for wines of value, with some new, sometimes unusual grape varieties, and different countries of production. We plan to source the wines for the group from individual wine suppliers across the U.K, and the Wine Society, rather than supermarket wines.

We have a full group at present, with 2 new individuals who tried us in October, and have now joined the group full time this month taking us to capacity. However, if any prospective new member is welcome to give us a try for a one-off session to come along for £8 to see what we are like as a group, and what we provide. We would organise this when we have people away for a one-off session. Usually this is 7 different wines each tasting session, much chat, and a little informative knowledge of what we are tasting and where and how it was produced
